In line with our aim of increasing our advocacy on behalf of members with Government, Mark Horsburgh, President Elect and Jeff Bergmann, Trustee have been busy considering the recent raft of papers from Government around IP reform, reform of the R & D tax incentive and the establishment of the Commercialisation Institute. Jeff made a

submission concerning the exclusion from eligibility for tax credit of commercial, legal and administrative aspects of patenting, licensing or other activities. Mark has sought appointment on behalf of LESANZ as a Board member to the Commercialisation Institute. Tomorrow’s Society”

To increase the attendance of LESANZ members at international events, the Trustees provide an annual award of registration and airfare to an international LES conference.

During May, I had the privilege of representing LESANZ at the 2009 LES Pan European conference in the delightful city of Copenhagen, Denmark.

The theme of the conference was “Environmental and Energy Technology Licensing in Tomorrow’s Society”. The organisers compiled a program to showcase the current trends in alternative energy, which demonstrated how advanced certain sectors indeed are in this area.

We learnt about an electric engine which outperforms Porsche and is now being rolled out by BMW in a trial fleet of 500 Minis – see [www.acpropulsion.com](http://www.acpropulsion.com).

We also had a presentation from the developer of technology for a combined window shading and photovoltaic glazing product. The initial aim was to develop a film to provide shading properties for glass-walled office buildings with performance competitive with solid manual shading. But someone decided to include a transparent PV cell in the film to run any necessary residual air-conditioning. So you get the shading properties and free air conditioning! See [www.photosolar.dk/pages/id1.asp](http://www.photosolar.dk/pages/id1.asp).

The formal elements of the conference closed with a site visit across the amazing bridge to Malmo in Sweden for a surprisingly enlightening presentation from the engineers developing a highly efficient natural gas-fired CHP plant in a decommissioned coal and oil-fired power plant.

We also had wonderful social events. The welcome reception was held at the renowned Tivoli Gardens in the centre of Copenhagen, one of the world’s oldest amusement parks. A highlight was the formal conference dinner at the Langelinie Pavilion with its waterfront views and fine examples of 1950’s Danish design (including Paul Henningsen’s world famous cone lamps) where we were treated to a virtuoso performance by the truly unique Stefan and Kim, including a hands-free piano duet (think about it!) –Ob-La-Di, Ob-La-Da will henceforth have a different resonance!.

However, the conference content is actually secondary to the amazing networking opportunities presented at international LES events. When you are the token (and novelty) Aussie half a world away from home, it’s amazingly easy to strike up conversation and gain a deeper appreciation of the global network that is LES.

And that’s without mentioning the sightseeing and

### REGIONAL REPORTS

#### Australian Capital Territory

The Canberra region had a few quiet weeks (hibernation in cold winter months), but we are now back on track with some interesting seminars leading up to the end of the year.

On 21 October, Vera Lipton, Business Development Manager for IP Australia presented a seminar titled "Open Innovation and IP: the European Experience". The seminar highlighted some open innovation perspectives of European organisations such as CERN and IP policies in the Netherlands and Finland.

In November Sarah Holcombe, Research Fellow at the National Centre for Indigenous Studies at ANU discussed the Aboriginal Knowledge and Intellectual Property Protocol developed through the Desert Knowledge CRC. This Protocol provides an excellent example of indigenous engagement.

Our final event for the year will be on 10th December with Nigel Poole from CSIRO speaking on WLAN: beyond wheat, wool and wombats. CSIRO's WLAN patent has been in commercialisation phase since 1995. However it was not until 2009, when CSIRO settled litigation with fourteen counterparties, that significant revenues were gained. The intervening period contained a spin out, licensing efforts, and patent action in Texas, Washington and San Francisco. This presentation covers the invention, the processes and the results from commercialisation of what might be the most widely adopted technology developed in Australia.

This will include a wrap up of the year and festive celebration.

#### New South Wales

Several people expressly noted they had attended seminars already on the topic and signed up to this event to now have a discussion.

Our next function was held in November and was hosted by FB Rice. Anna Grocholsky from Sydnovate and Bill Simpson-Young from NICTA both spoke to the topic of Getting commercial value out of public research. They are both experienced IP managers who've worked in both public and private sector, and delivered a good tale.

Our final event is on Commercialisation Australia: Tricia Berman, General Manager, Innovation Policy Branch - Innovation Division; DIISR will provide the latest update on progress in creating the Federal Government's latest commercialisation initiative announced in the 2009 budget. This will be held at Sydnovate and will include Christmas drinks on the 8th December at 5.45pm.

We are looking forward into next year and considering mixing up our usual schedule of events with some breakfast and/or lunchtime functions, which we have not traditionally conducted here. Looking further ahead still, we are looking to settle the dates for the 2011 Annual Conference in Sydney, so we can start locking in speakers. A number of speaker suggestions have already been circulated and we are continuing to develop our list. Subject to further discussions with conference organisers at the national level, we hope to significantly progress this before the end of 2009.

In June we co-hosted seminars in Auckland and Wellington on the pitfalls of international licensing, with presentations by Scott Yorke and Mark Hargreaves respectively. Scott and Mark each shared their knowledge of licensing clauses that are often used in New Zealand but are either unlawful or unenforceable in the Europe or the United States. They also provided practical tips on how to achieve the same objectives without falling into these traps. Each seminar was attended by more than 40 people involved in licensing and/or intellectual property law, providing excellent networking opportunities for those who stayed on for drinks afterwards.

In August, John Cunningham spoke to members in Wellington about best practice for commercialising intellectual property with particular focus on the public sector. John has a wealth of experience with public and private sector and the small group who attended took good advantage of this in the question and answer session. A lively discussion followed the presentation as a result.

Our October seminar entitled Thinking About the Way We Think About Innovation was both entertaining and thought-provoking. Tony Smale is an excellent speaker with some interesting and fresh ideas about culture and innovation.

On Thursday 12th November we held a late afternoon seminar on *UWA v Gray* in Auckland.
